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Worship Music Notes

Be Thou My Vision

Between A.D. 500 and 700 the Irish church was synonymous with missionary fervor. Only one missionary is honored with a global holiday, and only one is known by his own distinct color of green -- St. Patrick, of course, missionary to Ireland. Patrick was born in

A.D. 373, along the banks of the River Clyde in what is now called Scotland. His father was a deacon, and his grandfather a priest. When Patrick was about 16, raiders descended on his little town and torched his home. When one of the pirates spotted him in the bushes, he was seized, hauled aboard ship, and taken to Ireland as a slave. There he gave his life to the Lord Jesus. "The Lord opened my mind to an awareness of my unbelief," he later wrote, "In order that I might remember my transgressions and turn with all my heart to the Lord my God."

Patrick eventually escaped and returned home. His overjoyed family begged him to never leave again. But one night, in a dream, Patrick saw an Irishman pleading with him to come and evangelize Ireland. It wasn't an easy decision, but Patrick, about 30, returned to his former captors with only one book, the Latin Bible, in his hand. As he evangelized the countryside, multitudes came to listen. The superstitious Druids opposed him and sought his death. But his preaching was powerful, and Patrick became one of the most fruitful evangelists of all time, planting about 200 churches and baptizing 100,000 converts.

One historian commented that missionary effort was "the one all-absorbing national thought and passion." Irish missionaries labored from Scotland to Switzerland. One of these missionaries was Columba of County Donegal. His biographer says, "Certain spiritual songs, which had never been heard before, he was heard to sing." He was known as one of the poets of the Irish church. "Be Thou My Vision" comes from the seventh or eighth century, shortly after the time of Columba of Donegal. The word "vision" is used to indicate not only what we focus on but also what we strive for. As we strive for a goal, we gain a long-range perspective that helps us see today's disappointments as trivial when compared to the heavenly vision.

This anonymous hymn text expresses, in the quaint Celtic style, the ageless need of man to have a heavenly vision and to experience God's care and personal presence throughout this earthly pilgrimage. The author's high regard for God is evident in the various titles ascribed to Him: Vision, Lord, Best Thought, Wisdom, Word, Great Father, High King, Inheritance, Treasure, Sun, Ruler, and Heart.

Mary Byrne's translation of this ancient Irish poem into English prose was first published in 1905. The tune, SLANE, is a traditional Irish air published in 1909. The tune was originally used with a secular text, "With My Love on the Road." Its first association with this hymn text was in the Irish Church Hymnal of 1919. The tune is named for a hill, ten miles from Tara, in County Meath, where St. Patrick is said to have challenged King

Loegaire and the Druid priests by lighting the Paschal fire on Easter eve. Although the melody has been harmonized by various musicians, it is generally recommended that this tune is most effective when sung in unison.

May we as believers be characterized as people of vision -- "looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith." An anonymous writer penned these significant thoughts about the importance of having a vision for one's life:

A vision without a task is a dream;
A task without a vision is drudgery;
A vision with a task is the hope of the world.


