Advent

How does a weary world rejoice?—When our world is hard, when days are long and cumbersome, when our bodies and spirits are weary, it proves challenging to see JOY, be JOY, experience JOY. Thus, we need one another to remember the joy! So this Advent season we will join in the rituals of our faith – telling the story of God with us – and in doing so explore the question – How does a weary world rejoice?

Worship Art—Today's worship guide cover art features a charcoal and chalk on paper drawing by Rev. Lisle Gwynn Garrity titled *She Pondered*. The artist's statement is as follows:

When the shepherds see the newborn Messiah (confirming that their angelic night vision wasn't just a sleep-deprived hallucination), they deliver the angel's words to the new family. All are amazed by this pronouncement, except for Mary. She takes it all in, rolling the words over and over in her head, planting them deep in

her heart: "Good news . . . great joy . . . all people . . . a savior . . . the Messiah . . . a sign . . . wrapped in cloth . . . lying in a feeding trough." Why does she ponder these things if she already knew them?

I imagine Mary committing these words to muscle memory; she internalizes them so deeply within herself so that the words won't leave her—especially when the time comes for her baby son to be tested and tried and executed. Like the baby in her arms, these words become apart of her, filling like breath in her lungs.

I began this piece with a chaos of dark marks, smudging the entire paper black with charcoal. Then, starting from the middle, I began to draw with an eraser, etching the faces of Mary and her baby from the shadows. The result displays mother and child inextricably intertwined as light radiating amidst the darkness.



The Advent Wreath

The symbolism of the Advent wreath is beautiful. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, represents the *unending love of God*. Evergreens adorning the wreath symbolize the *hope of eternal life* that God's people share. Even more, the various parts of

evergreens have special Christian symbolism: the prickly leaves of holly remind us of the *crown of thorns*; cedar represents *strength and healing*; ivy reminds us of God's continuing *support and love* for us; the red berries remind us of *Jesus' sacrifice for us*; and pine cones, berries, nuts or seed pods used also symbolize the life and the resurrection. Finally, the four candles, 3 blue and 1 pink, set in the wreath represent the four weeks until Christmas Day, as well as the thousands of years people awaited the coming of the Messiah. The lighting of an additional candle each week in Advent marks the growing anticipation for the Light who



All together the Advent wreath stands for the new, everlasting life promised to us through Jesus Christ, who truly is Emmanuel, "God with us."



The Chrismon Tree

The word "Chrismon" is a combination of parts of two words: Christ and monogram...a monogram of Christ. They are made in white and gold. White refers to our Lord's purity and perfection; gold to his majesty and glory. The white lights on the tree point to Christ as the Light of the World.



The **crosses** symbolize our redemption through the crucifixion of our Lord. The two kinds of crosses we have used are the Latin cross and the Greek cross which has equal arms.



The **shepherd's crook** refers to the eternal one, "the Lord is my Shepherd."



The **five-pointed star** is symbolic of the divinity of Jesus, the **rose** in the center symbolizes his humanness.



The **crowns** are symbols of the kingship of our Lord; his victory over sin and death.





An equilateral triangle, or three-part figure symbolizes the Trinity: God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Spirit.

The **fish** was used by early Christians as a password during times of persecution. A fish that carries a basket of bread evokes a recollection of Jesus' miracles when he fed the multitude.



The **manger** symbolizes the baby Jesus and God as protector. A cross inside a circle is a symbol of eternity.

A circle symbolizes eternity. Three entwined circles are a symbol for the Holy Trinity, one God in three persons.



A cross over an orb (a ball) symbolizes our Lord's dominion over the earth. Does it remind you of the song, "He's Got the Whole World in His Hands"?



IHS stands for the first three letters of Jesus in the Greek alphabet.



Alpha and Omega, are the first and the last letters of the Greek alphabet. Since only God is before and after all things, it's a symbol of divinity.

Worship Practices

Sound System—We are excited to announce that the new sound system has been installed in the Sanctuary! The new system is designed to improve the sound in the space, not only in volume but in clarity and includes a Bluetooth hearing aid connectivity option. We are still testing and figuring out the settings and we appreciate your patience during this adjustment period. Once we fully understand the settings and capabilities, we will hold lessons on how to connect with the Bluetooth.

Children in Worship—We have a "Children in Worship" guiding brochure available in the Narthex! This brochure is intended to serve as an aid to parents and other members of our congregation in welcoming our children to worship. Children are always welcome to wiggle and giggle in the pews at FPC! During worship children are invited to join us at the front of the Sanctuary for a time of Wondering with God's Children. A nursery is available downstairs for children to be taken to at any time during worship. If you need help finding the nursery, you are invited to ask an usher and they'll point the way.

Friendship Registers—In each pew there is a pad with a black cover that we invite everyone to fill out. If the Friendship Register is nearest to you, please fill it out and pass it down the pew so it can reach everyone. When you pass it on, we invite you to introduce yourself to your pew friends! We encourage visitors and newcomers to connect with us by filling out the Friendship Register so we can be sure to send you a message to thank you for joining us.
